The Quebec Chess Federation is a non-profit organization founded in 1967 in Quebec City. It is subsidized by the Government of Quebec through the Ministry of Education. Its offices, along with other leisure and sports organizations, are in the St-Léonard district of Montreal. It benefits from several administrative advantages: rent, insurance, accommodation, and other services dedicated to leisure and sports. It has a board of directors of 7 members elected every two years.

This new location for amateur sports and recreation in Quebec open its doors in November 2022 and is providing an unprecedented showcase for the approximately 600 professionals and the hundred or so organizations that coordinate sports and recreation activities. The Maison, a five-story building, is erected on land located near the Metropolitan Highway and the corner of Lacordaire Street in the St-Léonard borough.

The Project to create a new Maison du loisir et du sport is the result of work carried out by the Société québécoise des infrastructures, the Regroupement Loisir et Sport du Québec, and the ministère de l'Éducation et de l'Enseignement supérieur. With the announcement of the construction of this new building, the Minister puts an end to more than 30 years of waiting for organizations that have been housed since 1985 in a former parking lot converted into offices at the Olympic Stadium.

PROPOSED SCHEDULE:

It is important to remember that when creating an important event, in addition to our goals for the event, we must assess where it fits in the current calendar of general chess tournaments. If we are creating a unique event, many other factors must be taken into consideration. The Canadian Closed is long event who last six days. The Open last 3 days. So to find the right place in the calendar is crucial. We decided to propose the Easter holidays because the mains tournament can benefit of two free days (Friday and Monday. Those days are usually legal holidays in Canada.

Historically, when the Canadian Championship was a zonal, it was accompanied by the Women's Championship. One of the difficulties, however, is to hold both tournaments according to the Swiss system with an equivalent number of rounds. The reason being that the number of active female players in Canada is much lower, which makes it difficult to maintain an integrated Swiss system.

This is why we are proposing a round-robin system of 10 hand-picked players for the women's part of the event. This means that the women's tournament will consist of 9 rounds. The schedule will be the same as the main tournament except for the last round. The other conditions are presented below.

If this idea is accepted, the composition of the tournament remains to be determined because the players must be chosen in advance according to criteria that remain to be determined. We have an idea on the subject that reminds us of the ways of doing things in the 1970s and 80s. The principle sought is that of regional representation.

So, for the 10 players, the selection would be as follows:

1 place for the defending Canadian Woman champion

3 places for Ontario

2 places for Québec

1 place for Maritime

1 place for Saskatchewan - Manitoba

1 place for Alberta

1 place for BC

Provinces will determine their representation. Time control will be the same as the main tournament: 90/30.
